accomplishments

Since our inception, SkeenaWild has been working hard to implement the progressive Wild Salmon Policy. Approved by the government of Canada in 2005, this policy could protect the abundance and diversity of salmon, and the benefits these fish provide to ecosystems and human well-being.

In 2009, our work resulted in significant reductions in non-selective, mixed-stock commercial fisheries, helping protect and rebuild non-target species, such as Steelhead and weak stocks of Sockeye and Chum.

In early 2014, SkeenaWild with the support and collaboration from First Nations were able to stop DFO from dramatically increasing harvest rates in the mixed-stock ocean fisheries.

Currently, SkeenaWild is working with Lake Babine Nation to provide technical support that will inform provincial water treatment plans for decommissioned mine pits in Babine Lake. We're also explaining how the proposed Morrison Lake copper-gold mine could impact salmonids.

how it works



Participants embed a conservation fee in the total cost of the client's trip. This fee is presented to the client as a donation to SkeenaWild on their behalf. The value of this fee is determined by each business or organization.

SkeenaWild provides postcards for your clients to better understand the importance of the Community Conservation Fund and to keep as a souvenir.

At year-end, the total sum of the fees collected are donated to SkeenaWild and allocated to the Community Conservation Fund. A charitable tax receipt for the matching amount is issued to the business.

Your business will also receive:

A cedar, salmon-shaped plaque hand carved by Terrace-based artist Rod Brown, which recognizes the contribution of your business towards community conservation
